Kitten Information Package

Some information which will help give you ideas about how to care for your new kitten and a few things for you to think about to make sure your new pet is healthy and happy!



Vaccinations

All new kittens should be vaccinated. This helps to protect them from fatal diseases that they can catch from other cats, off the pavements outside and even from dirt you may bring in on your shoes! Kittens need two vaccinations three weeks apart, followed by an annual booster to ensure they are fully protected for life. These vaccinations can be given once the kitten is 9 weeks of age.

Worming Treatment

It is very important that kittens are wormed on a regular basis. Many young kittens have worms but this can be easily treated. We advise that all kittens are given a worming treatment every 2 weeks until they are 12 weeks, then once a month until they are 6 months old then every 3 months thereafter. As an adult cat this is a preventative treatment to avoid a worm burden becoming a problem.

Flea Treatment

Flea prevention is very important from a young age to avoid fleas becoming a problem in your home. We would advise that a flea treatment is used once a month to prevent your kitten catching fleas. As with the worming treatment this should be continued for the lifetime of your cat.

Microchipping

Microchipping is a very useful method of helping to reunite you with your cat should he/she be stolen or run away. The microchip is a small rice-like chip that is implanted into the back of the cat's neck using a needle. This can then be scanned and an individual number is then registered with an independent company that will store your details should your pet go missing. If this should happen and he or she is scanned when found you will be contacted and reunited with your pet as soon as possible.

Insurance

As with any other insurance policy, pet insurance provides a support should your pet require any expensive or regular treatment creating a large bill over time. There are many policies available to new pet owners and therefore it is advisable to 'shop around'. It is important that you find a policy that will cover your pet for a condition for its lifetime (a lifelong policy) rather than one that will only pay for a year of treatment for a condition.

Diet

When you bring your new kitten home from the breeder you are often given a set menu that you should follow for your kitten. In order to avoid upsetting your kitten's stomach it is important that its diet is altered gradually but you can change from the breeder's recommendations. A complete kitten dry or wet food is a good option for feeding kittens. This will provide them with all the nutrients and energy that they need to grow and develop. These foods can then be changed at a later date for a complete food suitable for the age of the cat i.e. junior, adult, senior diets.

Neutering

Both queens and tom cats can be neutered at 6 months of age. We would strongly advise that this procedure is performed if you are not planning to breed from your kitten. This is important for health reasons as it can reduce the risk of tumours, cancers and infections in later life.
